GUIDELINES Proviso to Article 275(1) of the Constitution of India

December 2025



1. Salient features of Constitutional Provision

1.1 Constitution of India provides as under:

"Article 275. Grants from the Union to certain States – (1) Such sums as Parliament may by law provide shall be charged on the Consolidated Fund of India in each year as grants-in-aid of the revenues of such States as Parliament may determine to need assistance, and different sums may be fixed for different states.

Provided that there shall be paid out of the consolidated fund of India as grants-in-aid of the revenues of a State such capital and recurring sums as may be necessary to enable that State to meet the costs of such schemes of development as may be undertaken by the State with the approval of the Government of India for the purpose of promoting the welfare of the Scheduled Tribes in that state or raising the level of administration of the Scheduled Areas therein to that of the administration of the rest of the areas of that State."

1.2 Grants-in-aid under Proviso to Article 275(1) of Constitution of India are 100% annual grant from Government of India to States. It is charged to Consolidated Fund of India (except grants for NE States, a voted item) and is an additive to State initiatives and efforts for Tribal Development.

2. Basic Objective

2.1 Following will be objectives for programmes / activities funded with Grants-in-aid under Proviso to Art. 275(1) of Indian Constitution [Art. 275(1) Grants] to bridge gap between Scheduled Tribe (ST) population and others by accelerating development of STs by ensuring:

- a. Human resource development by enhancing their access to education and health services,
- b. Enhanced quality of life by raising the level of administration of the Scheduled Areas and also providing basic amenities in tribal areas / localities.
- c. Substantial reduction in poverty and unemployment through skill upgradation and other income generating opportunities, creation of backward and forward linkages and linkage with institutional finance for sustained income generation and creation of productive assets,
- d. Enhanced capacity to avail opportunities, gain rights & entitlements and improved facilities at par with other areas.

2.2 Art. 275(1) Grants is only an additive to State efforts for tribal

development and it must address need of plugging critical gaps.

3. Coverage of the Scheme:

3.1 States having notified STs are eligible to receive grants under this Programme.

4. Criteria for Allocation of Funds

4.1 Allocation of funds among States under the Scheme shall be made keeping in view proportion of ST population in the State, tribal area, districts, past performance/ support for innovation/ support for emergent need and for special purpose.

4.2 Allocation will be made in two phases; in the first phase 80% of the total budget allocation will be made and in the second phase 10% of the budget will be allocated basis utilization certificate (UC) and remaining 10% will be based on innovation.

First phase

- a. 2/3rd weightage to proportion of ST population in the State as per latest census to total ST population.
- b. 1/3rd weightage to proportion of tribal dominated areas(i.e. Districts where tribal population is 25% or more and LWE affected Districts). List of such Districts with area figures is at Annexure 2.

Second phase

- a. Allocation will be made taking into consideration past performance/ support for innovation/ support for emergent need and for special purpose as decided by Secretary MoTA in consultation with IFD.

4.3 Allocation to a State in the first phase shall be made as per weightage given above subject to a minimum of Rs. 8.00 crore. Actual release of funds to the State will be subject to submission of Utilization Certificate and Progress Report as per the provision of General Financial Rules. Funds allocated to States as above which is not released for reasons like pending UCs, PPR, lack of complete proposal, lack of physical progress etc. may be allocated to other States.

5. Prioritization of activities

5.1 State Governments shall identify and address critical gaps in sectors including education, health, drinking water, electrification, road connectivity, communication, culture and heritage, livelihood development, financial inclusion, agriculture, women and child development, renewable energy, horticulture, animal husbandry, eco-tourism, fisheries, dairy, skill development, and other income-generating activities. Gap assessment shall be the responsibility of the State Government and proposals must ensure convergence and avoid duplication with existing schemes.

5.2 Funds may be utilized for strengthening existing Integrated Tribal Development Agencies (ITDAs), establishing new ITDAs, and supporting dedicated micro-projects. These agencies shall act as nodal bodies for planning, implementation, and monitoring of tribal development initiatives.

5.3 Proposals targeting women beneficiaries shall be given priority. States shall ensure that at least 33% of total beneficiaries under the program are women, with gender-disaggregated reporting and monitoring.

5.4 Special attention shall be accorded to MADA and Bikhri clusters that house significant tribal populations but fall outside the Tribal Sub-Plan (TSP) coverage. States shall prepare micro-plans for these areas to ensure equitable access to services and livelihoods

5.5 Focus shall be placed on education, health, livelihood, skill development, and tourism sectors and funds shall have proportionate distribution as per the ST population across districts. Activities already covered under other schemes shall not be funded. Eligible activities shall be as per the notified Annexure I.

6. Plan Formulation and documentation

6.1 State Department in charge of Tribal Development will be the nodal Department for tribal development programmes/activities basis a 5 year action plan. The nodal Department will work in close coordination with all concerned line Departments.

6.2 State Government shall prepare a comprehensive perspective plan, taking into account all available sources of funding, to serve as a road map for implementation.

This perspective document shall, inter-alia, reflect on:

- a. Strategy to address gaps and deficits in terms of relevant schemes taking into consideration strengths of tribal community, allocation of funds, fixing physical targets to address inter-tribal and inter-habitation variance/inequalities in their socio-economic status, while adhering to an equity-based approach.
- b. Likely flow of benefits, in financial as well as physical terms, and specific steps required for accessing benefits by tribals from each of national (and State) level Flagship Schemes must be quantified.
- c. Mechanism/surveillance system to ensure utilization of funds meant for the intended purpose.
- d. Critical evaluation to assess whether ongoing schemes/programmes have potential to accelerate pace of development of STs and result in bridging gap in development in a time-bound manner.
- e. Outcome Analysis with critical evaluation of implementation strategies in terms of effectiveness of schemes / programmes.

6.3 The State shall break up Perspective Plan into doable annual Action Plans and accordingly prepare annual plan documents taking into account all available funds during year, including State Plan, Central Sector and Centrally Sponsored Schemes.

6.4 Secretary of the Nodal Department will be Member-Secretary of the Executive Committee (EC), chaired by Chief Secretary to State Government. The EC will be responsible for appraisal and approval of perspective document. The EC shall also be responsible for monitoring and evaluation of programmes and activities under implementation.

7. Institutional Structure

7.1 State Government shall establish (most already have) following institutional structures and mechanism for effective formulation, implementation and monitoring the programme.

(A) State Level

Executive Committee shall be established with the following composition:

Key functions:

- Appraisal of perspective document and finalization of Annual Plan.
- Monitoring and Evaluation / implementation of Annual Plan.
- Formulation of strategy for tackling development deficit of STs.

The Executive Committee will hold its meetings once every three months.

(B) District Level

a. District Planning and Monitoring Committee (DPMC) shall be established with following composition:

The DPMC may also have representation from local legislative and parliamentary constituencies.

Key functions:

- Formulate plan at the District level.
- Get it approved by the District Planning Committee.
- Review implementation of programmes / activities under Art. 275(1) Grants

every month.

- Communicate Quarterly Performance Review Report to nodal Department for review by it and Executive Committee.

b. Panchayati Raj Institutions: Zila Parishad / Panchayat Samiti Level

Panchayati Raj Institutions should review implementation of ongoing development programmes / activities in different locations on a monthly / quarterly basis and forward their observations to DPMC.

8. Submission of Proposal to MoTA by States

- a. Proposals shall be approved by Executive Committee in the State concerned chaired by Chief Secretary of the State, before sending to MoTA.
- b. Proposal submitted to MoTA must have proper analysis of State Efforts made in bridging gaps in core sectors of development.
- c. Proposals should clearly indicate categorization between proposals for 'Creation of Capital Assets' and those for 'General Recurring Expenditure'.
- d. Proposals submitted to MoTA must be accompanied by:
 - i. Utilization Certificate of previous years' releases in the format as prescribed under General Financial Rules.
 - ii. Physical progress report of previous years' sanctioned projects/activities.
 - iii. Certificate of availability of land and other clearances, as applicable, in case of projects under 'creation of capital assets'.
 - iv. Certificate that the estimated cost of the project is as per Schedule of Rates (SoR) or approved norms of State Government.
- e. Skill Development proposals must be NSQF compliant as prescribed by concerned Ministry and any other instruction of Government of India issued from time to time.
- f. Locations of projects shall be identified with LGD code apart from usual address.

9. Approval Process

9.1 The proposal received from the State Government(s) will be appraised and approved by the Project Appraisal Committee (PAC) in Ministry of Tribal Affairs (MoTA). The composition of PAC shall be as under:

Chairperson PAC may co-opt persons to suggest expertise in the matters required by PAC.

10. Funding

- a. Funding under this Scheme would be 100% grant-in-aid by the Ministry of Tribal Affairs to the State(s) with the approval of PAC.
 - i. Fund in respect of approved proposals in first phase will be released in instalment(s) taking into account pending UC / Physical Progress Report (PPR).
 - ii. Funds under second phase will be released after approval of the PAC.
 - iii. In the unlikely event that PAC cannot be convened due to unforeseen circumstances, Secretary in consultation with IFD may decide on the mechanism for release of funds.
- b. States shall furnish the Utilization Certificate in the prescribed form 12-C of General Financial Rules, 2017 and the Physical Progress Report in the format at Annexure 3.

11. Administrative Expenditure

11.1 An amount upto the maximum of 2% of the total allocation under the Scheme will be used for meeting various administrative expenses.

12. Monitoring

12.1 State Government shall ensure that the funds provided under the scheme are transferred to the implementing agencies through Public Financial Management System (PFMS) expeditiously.

12.2 State Tribal (Nodal) Department shall co-ordinate progress of various schemes/ programmes and design a comprehensive monitoring framework with well-defined indicators covering fund allocation, release and expenditure, service delivery standards as well as outcomes.

12.3 State Tribal (Nodal) Department shall ensure review of progress by the Executive Committee (Chaired by Chief Secretary) on quarterly basis.

12.4 State Tribal (Nodal) Department shall utilize the AdiGram portal and all documentations to be put there including list of projects in operation, details of transfer of funds to implementing agencies, progress report of projects, review of progress by Executive Committee, Annual Report, Geo-tagged photographs relating to various projects, list of beneficiaries under various schemes, relevant videos / documentaries / success stories etc.

12.5 State Tribal (Nodal) Department shall furnish Quarterly Performance Review report through online system (<https://grants.tribal.gov.in/adigram>) / e-mail.

12.6 State Tribal (Nodal) Department shall provide exact locations identified through LGD codes (Block and Villages) in respect of all the interventions, and provide break up, activity wise in the Physical Progress Report (PPR) as per the format in Annexure 3.

12.7 The Ministry of Tribal Affairs, Government of India will carry out concurrent monitoring through physical and financial reports and visits by officers of the Ministry to review the scheme.

12.8 Mid-term review will be undertaken by Secretary (TA). Ministry of Tribal Affairs shall also undertake quarterly review meeting of the progress of work both physical and financial.

12.9 Funds under beneficiary-oriented projects shall be released through DBT as per instructions of Government of India issued from time to time.

Eligible activities for funding under Grants

Annexure I

- a. Under Education Infrastructure, Ashram schools and hostels shall be standardized and upgraded to norms equivalent to Kasturba Gandhi Balika Vidyalaya (KGBV), Jawahar Navodaya Vidyalaya (JNV), or other recognized residential schools, ensuring quality infrastructure and digital learning facilities.
- b. Under Eco-Tourism Development, projects shall promote tribal homestays, nature walks, and cultural experiences located within 10–15 km of tourist sites, heritage sites, trekking routes, or wildlife parks. Clusters of minimum 20 tribal homestays shall be identified and provided with civic amenities, street lighting, and spring water / water connection, and capacity building of staff would be done through a hospitality agency.
- c. Under Sacred Groves, projects shall promote the conservation and management of traditional sacred groves to preserve the cultural heritage of vulnerable tribal communities. Sacred groves may include any traditional local place, site, object, or natural resource of worship with mythological or cultural significance. Activities will focus on protecting these sites and supporting community-led efforts for their upkeep and cultural continuity.
- d. Under Livelihood Development, community-driven, income-generating projects aligned with local resources and traditional knowledge shall be prioritized. These include MFP-based enterprises, agriculture processing units, eco-tourism-linked ventures, and local industries. Plantation-based livelihoods e.g. cash crops such as coffee, tea, and rubber shall be supported through convergence with MNREGA and forest departments, following due forest guidelines. Infrastructure support such as cold storage and connectivity shall be sanctioned.
- e. Under Skill Development, programs for the local youth shall focus on both traditional crafts and emerging sectors, and cater to inaccessible tribal areas. Vocational training areas include indigenous crafts, hospitality (in partnership with reputed hotel chains), language training (local and foreign languages for nurses), and technical trades such as motor driving, solar water systems, and bio-toilets.
- f. Under Health, projects shall include transport solutions such as mini-vans and buses to provide timely access to medical facilities, considering limitations of MMUs. Nursing colleges shall be promoted in tribal areas along with neonatal ICUs, Tribal Health Observatories, and TB elimination programs. Integration with traditional healers for disease specific issues shall enhance trust and outreach.
- g. Under Malaria Eradication, interventions shall focus on proactive surveillance, seasonal chemoprevention, and strengthening diagnostic capacity through mobile labs and trained ASHAs. Vector control shall include larval source management, insecticide-treated nets, and community-driven environmental

sanitation. IEC campaigns shall promote early treatment-seeking and preventive behaviors.

- h. Under Leprosy Eradication, projects shall emphasize active case detection through door-to-door screening and contact tracing, especially in high-endemic pockets. Community health workers shall be trained to identify early symptoms and ensure timely referral and treatment. IEC campaigns using tribal languages and culturally relevant media shall reduce stigma and promote adherence.
- i. Under Women and Child Development, community-rooted crèches integrating play-based early learning, daily hot meals, growth monitoring, immunization facilitation, nutrition and reproductive health counseling, iron and folic acid supplementation and peer support groups / awareness sessions shall be prioritized. Nutrition gardens or Poshan Vatikas shall be established to generate nutritious food availability and income for schools, promoting nutrition security and sustainable livelihoods.
- j. Under Drinking Water Supply, assessment-based projects shall ensure saturation of community-based piped water connections, guaranteeing inclusive and equitable access. Source sustainability, water quality testing, and community-led operations and maintenance shall be integral components.
- k. Under Animal Husbandry and Dairy Development, interventions shall ensure 100% vaccine availability through a strong supply chain and last-mile delivery. Veterinary infrastructure shall be upgraded with modern dispensaries, cold chains, and mobile units. Genetic improvement of indigenous breeds shall be promoted via artificial insemination and embryo transfer.
- l. Under Renewable Energy Interventions, focus shall be on imparting solar energy-based skilling for income augmentation and provision of solar equipment for farming, street lighting, and other productive uses.
- m. Under Capacity Building, initiatives shall be undertaken through partnerships with education and digital transformation sectors. Programs shall include study circles for competitive exams, digital literacy initiatives, and leadership training for young tribal officers.
- n. Tribal start-up incubation hubs for local enterprises (MFP, crafts, agro-processing, tourism) with common equipment, branding, and e-commerce support
